

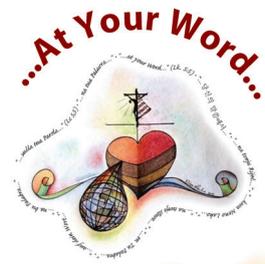

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Editorial

When young people meet Christ

One of the most memorable moments of 2019 has been Pope Francis' visit to Panama with the young people. Stories show the innovative and renewing power of the meeting.

Life experiences like those of Erika de Bucktron or Alfredo Martínez Andrión and Mirmeen Odeh and many others witness how Jesus Christ is interested in each of our stories, searches out our gaze, our desires, listens to our hearts, and gives water to our dry souls. He is ready to stop us on the street corners, and look into our eyes to tell us how much He loves us. These young people told how material and spiritual poverty had condemned them to live in social isolation, led them to suffer terrible loneliness. Only in meeting the gaze of Christ who welcomed them like a Father does with his children, were they capable of climbing over the mountain in order to be embraced by Love who transformed them into witnesses of the resurrection of Him who gives and never asks.

His presence, begun with the coming of Jesus into our midst, continues to be renewed day after day in the streets of the entire world and for all those who hunger and thirst to meet him.

Often we wonder if, in such a technologically advanced world, there is still room for the spirit of God, for the Human.

In fact, the new way of relating to the world, through instruments allowing immediate connection, but, though always virtual and more interesting to young people, remains an experience of extreme loneliness. And, it is this very state of mind that drives them to desire meaningful relationships instead, life-giving encounters, the ability to restore humanity to the human.

Therefore, the ethical nucleus upon which we can build true renewal, authenticity of encounter understood as a joyful metamorphosis of our existence, is that of recognizing ourselves as human creatures with the seed of transcendence, whose greatest and unquestionable proof is the cross.

Today more than ever, Christ is asking us consecrated people who are called to make our lives a witness of love, to become companions on the journey and accompany our neighbors, especially the young people, toward the new road, the road to Emmaus trod by the Risen Jesus.

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185th Anniversary of the Congregation in Acuto

On March 4, Sr. Nadia Coppa, General Superior, Sr. Dani Brought, Sr. Matija Pavić and Sr. Wiesława Przbylyo participated in the celebration of the 185th anniversary of the birth of the congregation in Acuto.

An important moment for the ASC Family, which, as S. Nadia expressed in her general letter for the occasion, calls us to live it as a very great opportunity to feel even more united as a single body, and animated by the same missionary passion. Maria De Mattias' dream continues in the life and commitment of each of us called to be an adorer-apostle of the Precious Blood.

At 4:30 p.m. in Acuto, the people of God gathered together with the Sisters in the little



church of the Sisters, as the chapel connected to the foundation house of the Adorers is commonly called. Together they prayed the Precious Blood Chaplet, a prayer that has been passed down for generations and which Maria had often taught and prayed with the people as she was moved by that fire of Love that drove her to be completely God's and completely for her dear neighbor. The chaplet that recalls the mysteries of Christ's blood sheddings during his lifetime teaches us to honor and praise the Blood of Christ: an expression of the measure and pledge of God's Love for humanity.

The solemn Eucharistic celebration, with Father Francesco Bonanno, CPPS, presiding, was animated by the songs sung by the elementary school choir of Acuto, directed by Maurizio Sparagna, a devoted Acutan. After the celebration, a procession followed, with brief stops for reflection and prayer at the dwellings where Maria De Mattias and the first Adorers lived: the Pillozzi house, the Frasca house and the Stefani

house. During this pilgrimage, the choir director Sparagna and Sr. Angela Di Spirito, ASC, led the journey with stories from the life of St. Maria De Mattias that have been passed down from one generation to the next and in the musical "Run, Run, Maria" that expresses her apostolic zeal. The procession then reached the Piazza del Collegio, currently the headquarters of the Maria De Mattias Spirituality Center where Sr. Nadia Coppa, General Superior of the Congregation, gave a reflection on the missionary spirit of St. Maria De Mattias in today's history. She then thanked the Sisters and all the organizers of the event. The release of balloons was surprising and touching as it expressed the common joy and gratitude to the saint. The celebration concluded with a reception enjoyed by all.

With this event the Adorers wanted to recall that life for the foundress was an ongoing, difficult yet passionate journey urged on by the search for pleasing God alone and the desire to bring souls to Him.

The triduum of preparation that preceded the celebration united the entire congregation with lay collaborators and ASC Associates, in a single choir of gratitude and praise to the Lord for the gift of St. Maria De Mattias to the Church and for the charism, which, like a fertile seed, the Lord put into her heart.

Bolivians Participate in Lima Symposium

In January, 14 Bolivians joined 250 mostly Peruvian persons in a symposium sponsored by the Center of Spirituality of the Blood of Christ in Lima, Peru.

The Bolivian delegation was composed of three ASCs and 11 lay people who share our spirituality, some as Associates and others as coworkers in our pastoral ministry. Most traveled by bus some 26 hours from Desaguadero on the Bolivian/Peruvian border, but others even before this, had to travel another day by land from Marumpampa, Santa Cruz and Tarija.

With great interest, they took in the two presentations on the spirituality of the Blood of Christ by Fr. Barry Fischer, CPPS., two by our own Sister Sonia Matos, ASC, and one each by Dr. Juan Bosco Monroy and Sister Isabel Chavez.

The talks were followed by group break-out sessions that provided an opportunity to deepen and personalize the content, as well as get to know others of the larger Precious Blood family.

Before coming to the symposium, each Bolivian made a commitment to share the experience and content of the three days with the group they represented, so the reverberations will continue to make waves in their lives and in the lives of others.

It was a truly blessed opportunity made even richer by the splendid hospitality of the Peruvians who showed us the best of their culture.

Sadbhawna and Interfaith Dialogue

India is a land of diverse religions. It has set an example of unity in diversity as people of different castes and religions live in harmony. The Constitution of India is unique in its nature, composition and character. For, the Indian nation emerged as a result of an evolution of socio-political and religious-cultural ideologies and principles that guided human society through the centuries. Many races, cultures, religions and ideologies interact often causing conflicts and clashes, invasions and wars. However, the basic principle of 'live and let live' did promote tolerance and mutual goodwill. Liberty, equality and fraternity, fellowship, justice and peace may have appeared to be elusive. Through the dynamic vision of the founding fathers, the sacred Constitution that governs our nation was gifted to the Nation on January 26, 1950.

PROJECT Exporting prison reality

The step in moving from an idea to a project is as short as it is critical. Dale Carnegie said, "We can all do things we never thought we would be able to do. But if you never risk, you'll never know your potential." Risking does not mean throwing yourself into something, but having the lucidity to evaluate each idea and know how to grab hold of the first signs of a project.

A project does not arise in the abstract. It comes from a desire to respond to a need. My entering into the Rebibbia prison was not easy, nor simple. I tiptoed in with my heart pounding. I was immediately struck by the faces that seemed sad, gaunt, and withered. This made my heart twinge. The mainspring was observing a young man with a blank, sad face uninterested in anything. For me this was the beginning of an attentive, silent listening, an entering into the woundedness of each one, in understanding their pain and loneliness, empathizing with the burden of the years to be served, the sadness for the distance from their families. Step by step, I thought that all this could be part of a book. The literary contest, which is now in its fifth edition, was born. But how could this world be made known to the most unknown, to those looked at with suspicion, segregated, outcast and judged?

And so was born the idea of exporting an experience of years lived near so many prisoners from various rungs of the social ladder, from a variety of cultures and backgrounds, Catholics or not, to let them enter into homes and hearts, to make them accepted and shared.

So then it is that ASCs, CPPSs and laity together offer to make the prison world in all its facets known among the people of God through parishes, associations, schools and various institutions. Prison does not just regard the people living or working there, but it regards everyone because it regards human brokenness and its consequences.

For our first experience, we will go to Amelia, in Umbria, at the L. Lama Town Library with the UNITRE (University for Senior Citizens) with Dr. Edoardo D'Angelo and professor Maria Teresa Caccavlae, the authorities and people of the place.

Whoever intends to approach this reality is invited to join this project, because the participation of more people, in addition to covering more areas for intervention, would witness to an outgoing Church, so dear to Pope Francis.

BECOMING A WOMAN ... WHAT HARD WORK!

In the wake of Pope Francis' statement about feminine geniality and the many and various claims of our own time, the spring of which he spoke is increasingly promising.

At the same time, to better manage the positive nature inherent in the ongoing revolution, which numerous debates, studies and publications, as well as slogans give voice to, the need to become more aware of the specific contribution women are able to give to the world is urgently being noticed.

Despite that, even in Western culture, violence against women continues and is increasing. Their abandonment or, conversely, their own presence creates fear. Can there ever be a healing of the fundamental man-woman relationship inherent in creation and in the possibility of growth?

Together with other women, we decided to meet at our Spirituality Center every 2 weeks over a cup of tea to talk about us, to search together for the meaning of living our femininity, in order to look toward the future with clear and transparent eyes.

The group, made up of women between the ages of 47 and 63, appreciated the wonderful opportunity to talk about ourselves and share our experiences of maturity, of greater independence from our now-grown children and, in spite of some affective failures, looked at ourselves with new enthusiasm.

During these meetings, amid the trust sprinkled with smiles and tears, the desire developed to gather life stories to analyze them in the light of the years of change and this hard-earned feminine emancipation.

The world of today's women is not just enclosed in the family, but, fortunately, is also expressed in the outside world, that of work and relationships with others. But, the weakness of the human fabric which, unfortunately, shows its cracks even more, risks overburdening women with responsibilities that are not theirs.

And perhaps, "the hard work," emphasized in the title with an exclamation point, wants to show precisely the often victorious attempt, but also often disillusioned one, of being able to stem the pain and injustices in human relationships with "feminine" power.

In times like ours where the acceleration of communications is united with its superficiality, this book leads us to reflect upon paths of life and cultural insights that show how women, though in just individual differences, can still represent a supportive universe in full awareness of its own value.

Today it is clear to everyone that one is born "feminine", but she becomes a "Woman" often and only in the light of the desire to "work hard" on herself in order to let what could remain forever latent emerge and perhaps be transformed into a more or less instinctive input imposed by situations and by the dominant thought. And this at the expense of "that beautiful order of things," so dear to St. Maria De Mattias, that everything around each person, institution and reality of ours is invoked to rebuild a new harmony filled with all the contributions that the transformations in place allow.

The book concludes with a decisive " **Today, not yesterday, nor tomorrow!**

The photo display, showing the beginnings of the life of the ASCs in Czestochowa – Kiedrzny and the history of the house with the various changes thanks to the work of the Sisters throughout the years, was a real success.

After the celebrations in church, everyone received a surprise: cookies in the shape of a heart with attached quotes from St. Maria De Mattias' letters.

The 300 heart-shaped cookies had been baked and decorated with red icing by the Sisters a few days before the celebration.

That day the doors to our home were thrown open to welcome all the arriving guests. Everyone found something good to eat on the table because everyone brought something to share.

The prayer and celebrations once again gave us the opportunity to deepen the charism of Maria De Mattias, "Ordinary Saint and Extraordinary Woman."

25th Regional Assembly of the Adorers of the Blood of Christ, Region of Zagreb



The Adorers of the Blood of Christ of the Zagreb Region celebrated the second session of their 25th Regional Assembly January 26-27, 2019. The theme was "Journeys of Mercy." Laity and members of the Community of the Blood of Christ and ASC Associates participated together with the Sisters on the first day of the Assembly.

This was a unique experience of what we can call a new Pentecost for all the participants. The 43 Sisters and 40 laity coming from various parts of Croatia and Bosnia-Herzegovina reflected and shared on the life and spirituality of the Blood of Christ, appreciating the current way of journeying together, trying to dream and plan for the future.

In her introduction and the opening of the work together, Sr. Ana Marija Antolović, regional superior, greeted all the participants and read the message Sr. Nadia Coppa, general superior, had sent from Rome.

Sr. Daniela Anić also gave a report prepared for the occasion with the title, "The Blood of Christ – Source of Life and Holiness," which was a beautiful opportunity for communal reflection and an invitation to deepen the contemplative, paschal and apostolic identity of life in the Blood of Christ.

In the continuation of work, four Adorers and one ASC lay Associate enriched us with a sharing of their experience of many years of working and collaboration in the creation of the groups and leadership of the communities of the Blood of Christ. In the work of sharing in groups, there was a search to evaluate the journey completed and to identify paths for the future. Nine groups, four led by Sisters and five by laity, brought their sharing back to the whole group. All the groups in an open and rich sharing gave special attention to the hopes and vision for the future journey together of the ASC Sisters, the Associates and the members of the Communities of the Blood of Christ (ZKK).

The result of the communal sharing and the conclusions led to the writing of a final Declaration of the Assembly, which was afterwards sent to all the Sisters and laity who share our spirituality with the desire that in the future our journey together will be even more fruitful for the Church and for society.

JPIC IN OUR HEALTH SERVICES

According to our spirituality and our mission, the needs of taking care of the sick and abandoned were present since 1969 when the first ASC missionaries came to plant the seed of God's love. They were not only taking care of human needs, but all the creation of God. Therefore, following their example, we Tanzanian ASC do practice

collaborating with the Church and other societies and we follow the call of Vatican II, to express the works of mercy in prayer and action, by:

- Helping those who are in need physically, mentally and spiritually:
 - o For those with cured diseases, we give health education on how to prevent such diseases;
 - o For poor and abandoned persons, we find the back history and at the same time deal with their needs;
 - o For people with mental problems, we do our level best. If we fail, we advise their relatives about referrals and further management;
 - o For spiritual conditions, we listen, making dialogue to help them to recover by accepting their conditions;
 - o We take care of mothers and children.

CARING FOR THE INTEGRITY OF CREATION

These are some of the things we do to protect creation:

- We try to keep our environment clean, inside and out;
- We separate waste materials in three different buckets:
 - o Dangerous materials
 - o Non-dangerous materials
 - o Hard (dry) materials
 - o We planted trees surrounding our hospital.
 - o We prepare plants of trees and flowers for others.
 - o We give health education and advice to those we meet, sharing the advantages and disadvantages of taking care of or destroying creation.



Every three months and whenever necessary, we have a meeting for sharing and evaluation, in order to improve our ministries according to the mission of Jesus to give life to all creation, and according to the spirit of St. Maria De Mattias.
