The Wood Project

In late August, Sisters Michelle Woodruff and Maureen Farrar learned they were the recipients of a *Sisters on the Front Lines* grant of \$1,000 from The Catholic Extension Society. The purpose of the grant was to provide immediate help to people in need.

The greatest challenge was to determine who and what among many people with many needs in and around our home in Crownpoint, New Mexico, on the Navajo Indian Reservation. The decision was made to buy and deliver wood since so many of the people, especially the elderly and those who live in more remote areas, still use wood stoves for both heating and cooking. Many do not have anyone to haul wood for them, much less chop it.

Plans were put in place: a woman in an area where we don't ordinarily work but which has great need, would contact a couple of men who were wood haulers, purchase several loads of wood and deliver a load to each of eight families (out of a list of 72 she'd identified as needing assistance!). Our intent was to assist in the deliveries, but when Michelle tested positive for Covid-19, that wasn't possible, so someone else stepped in to deliver the wood. We continued coordinating with a couple of wood haulers in Crownpoint and were able to assist them with deliveries to another eight families in the general area. One of the women who received wood told the men who delivered it, "I'm so happy you came! I was about ready to tear some boards off my woodshed to burn because I'm so cold."

Memorial Day of the Victims – Martyrs of the Civil War

On November 18, 2020, the Day of Remembrance of the Victims of the Homeland War and the Day of Remembrance of the Victims of Vukovar and Škabrnja were marked in the Republic of Croatia.

The cities Vukovar and Škabrnja are places that have become symbols of suffering in the Homeland War and are symbols of resistance, unity and sacrifice made for the freedom we live in Croatia today.

On the eve of Vukovar Memorial Day and the 29th anniversary of the Škabrnja massacre, candles were lit and prayers were said throughout Croatia to commemorate the victims of the 1991-95 Homeland War and the defeat of Vukovar's defense forces on November 18, 1991.

These days are the reminder of gratitude but also of deep wounds that have not completely healed. Every year, many visitors/ Croats come and participate in the commemorative program.

The Adorers of the Blood of Christ, who have been actively participating in the life of the


city of Vukovar since 2003, also took part in the Remembrance Day. Through their quiet presence, prayer and work, the sisters mediate God's nearness to everybody.

COVID -19 called a pandemic by the World Health Organization, is, according to me, a mega pandemic, because no other pandemic has affected people in as many countries as this didi. Nothing in our lifetime has ever caused the world to shut down. Every country that has tried to follow a different path calibrated or otherwise has discovered that a shutdown is inevitable. It was a struggle with pain and confusion, and at times, with prayers for collective redemption.


During this pandemic we are forced to learn new lessons and rediscover the value of some old ones in our life. If any old lesson comes in handy during the COVID-19 crisis it is that hygiene helps. We have all been taught to wash our hands every time we've been to a place that could have disease-causing germs, when we return home from outside and from time to time for good measure. Yet, if the upward graph of soap sales during the crisis is any indication, it was as if we were discovering the value of washing hands for the first time.

We have lived through а lockdown. availability of food, water, The shelter, communication, medicines and education and entertainment on television & the internet has kept us going. The lockdown forced us to ask what we really need to live reasonably well. And the answer in most cases is – not too much. While physiological and security needs have been paramount, many have found ways to learn

new skills or do things they have always wanted to do but couldn't make time for. Families and friends have engaged over video calls and many have "met" members of their family more often during the lockdown than they otherwise do! Despite the lockdown we have discovered many new things which have brought new rhythm to our life.

Meanwhile, in the absence of human touch we are erecting huge walls of separation and exclusion. In order to survive biologically we are living with masks and sanitizers; we are living with chronic fear and anxiety; or we are escaping through all the apps that make it possible to 'work from home'. Even when we are technically alive, we are dead—aesthetically and spiritually. Seldom do we ask what ought to be asked: What is work? What is productivity? What is progress? What is education? And above all, what is the rhythm of life and death?
