The 2022 Extended General Council meeting with the theme "We Hold a Treasure in Earthenware Vessels." opened on September 16 at 9:30 during the Eucharistic celebration with Father Marco Tanghetti, General Superior of the Rosminians, presiding. September 16-22, the Regional Superiors, Coordinators of Guinea Bissau and Korea, together with the General Administration and the members of the 2023 GA Preparatory Commission, presented the theme of Vulnerability. The presentations of Father Amedeo Cencini and Sr. Sonia Matos, ASC, allowed us to read the global context with a broader and more deeply charismatic view. We experienced days of deep listening, and fearless sharing in mutual trust regarding the vulnerabilities we experience and boldly and courageously cherish so that they may be a resource, an opportunity for us, for the Church and for humanity.

"We hold a treasure in our earthen vessels: a charism that is in the heart of the Church and is a vital and generative response to the cry of humanity, of a concrete today ... and of a vulnerable humanity of which we are a part.

These were important days in which, in a spirit of discernment, we looked with serene objectivity at our reality as a congregation recognizing the power of vulnerability and renewing our common desire to continue walking together strengthened by the communion we have experienced and by the charism that vibrantly cries out in us and propels us

We have confirmed that our Paschal Identity, marked by the Blood of the Lamb ... is the greatest treasure, the most beautiful resource that we are called to share, to spread for the transformation of the world. The mystery of a Vulnerable God encourages us to embrace our humanity with humility and passion.

Fixing our gaze on Jesus, on the mystery of his self-emptying, his kenosis, we are ready to continue our journey as missionary Adorers by pushing ourselves to service that includes everyone, especially the most vulnerable.

Like Jesus, we desire to be close to people, making ourselves neighbors, taking charge of situations, seeking to work well "with" and "through" others. This calls us to greater attention to the care

of relationships so that they become a sacred space and workshop of recognition and appreciation of the other, of true dialogue, co-responsibility." (cfr. Closing remarks of Sr. Nadia Coppa, ASC)

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The transformation processes begun (revision of our Proper Law, representation at the 2023 GA, and intermediate structures) were completed in their collegial phases. The results of these big processes will be handed over to the 2023 GA for the concluding discernment.

On September 21 the 2023 GA Preparatory Commission, together with Sr. Mercedes Donato, SCMR who facilitated the work, presented the General Assembly theme: In the Blood of Christ ... All Things New. The theme, presented in a creative and engaging way, allowed the participants to experience all the

vitality that it can generate, creating genuine interest in delving into it. They filled everyone with much positive energy and were an inspiration to begin the process, in searching, to sample the power of the new life coming from the Blood of Christ.

So, let us prepare for the 2023 GA, aware of the process we have done together and ready to take on the newness God is already suggesting to our hearts.

ASC-CPPS on a synodal journey to become the Church of the future.

Since 2019, the General Curias of the CPPS Missionaries and the Adorers of the Blood of Christ have committed themselves to sharing some projects in order to grow in belonging to and deepening our common spirituality of the Blood of Christ. Fidelity to the charism most deeply invites us to respond to the Church's call to live synodality, beginning with our own. One of these projects was the celebration of the Year of Mercy.

The idea of celebrating a Year of Mercy and Conversion was born, for the missionaries from the CPPS General Assembly, with the commitment to carry it out right from the beginning of the mandate; for the ASC curia, living the value of

conversion is to respond to the call to transformation, an opportunity, a time of grace to prepare for the next AG 2023. The project was implemented through a spiritual retreat for the leadership groups of the two Congregations.

The theme of the exercises,

TO RECEIVE MERCY AND TO FIND GRACE... (Heb 4:16), was skillfully developed by the two presenters, Sr. Patrizia Pasquini, ASC, and Fr. Benedetto Labate, CPPS, who led us in reflection for a week, September 4 - 11. The retreat prepared together by an Adorer and a Missionary was already a sign of novelty, an experience of communion and synodality based on reflection on the spirituality of the Blood of Christ.

The event, the first in our history, brought together 72 participants, Missionaries, Adorers and two Missionary Sisters of the Precious Blood from Poland, to reflect, from the texts of Sacred Scripture, on the theme of universal brotherhood and sisterhood proposed by Pope Francis in the Encyclical Fratelli Tutti.

The meditations, simultaneously translated into the different languages of the participants, gave the possibility to meditate, in a very personal way, on the theme of forgiveness and healing necessary to live in fraternity. They offered the possibility to dialogue and share the gift of the Blood of Christ and its value, and to grow in

communion and in the spirit of synodality.

The journey included a visit to the places of our founders.

On the afternoon of September 5, the group made a pilgrimage to Santa Maria in Trivio to the tomb of St. Gaspar and Venerable John Merlini, where they experienced a moment of prayer, led by CIS members. Immediately afterwards, the group went the Church of the Precious Blood to venerate the remains of St. Maria De Mattias and pray together at her tomb. For both the Adorers and the Missionaries, these were exciting and joy-filled moments, especially for those who were visiting these places for the first time. The evening ended with a community reception with the ASC


The pilgrimage continued on September 10 and 11 with the group going to Vallecorsa and Acuto and then to San Felice di Giano and Albano in Lazio, important CPPS pilgrim spots. The CPPS and CIS members shared much about

the history and charism of our congregations. These were times of prayer, discernment, deepening communion, and fraternity among the congregations, and times for renewing the freshness of the dream of our origins.

On Monday, September 12, the General Superiors, Sr. Nadia Coppa and Fr. Emanuele Lupi, dialogued with the provincial superiors present from both congregations on the theme of the Family and the Precious Blood, reflecting also on the lay movements. We entrust the gift of God's Spirit and the power of Jesus' blood to bless the dreams for our future. The program ended with the Eucharistic Celebration and the mandate: Go down from the mountain and announce to the communities, the brothers and sisters we are called to serve, the joy of having been forgiven, saved, redeemed.

He stressed the importance of solidarity between the Church and Mary, the Mother of Jesus, as they have been entrusted with a great responsibility to nurture the domestic Church, the family. He said that God has given mothers the ability to carry on life and the mission of caring for the family, so they are the pillars of the domestic Church (family) and together with their husbands are responsible for educating the youth and children in morals and faith.

Canonical Visitation to Mozambique and Wswatini

On August 18, 2022 together with the General Superior, Sr. Nadia Coppa, and Sr. Bridget Pulickakunnel, General Councilor, who had come to Tanzania to celebrate 20 years of the Village of Hope, Sr. Lucina Johaness, ASC Regional Superior, and I flew from Dar Es Salaam bound for Mozambique. The plan was to make the canonical visitation to the ASCs living in Mozambique.

The next day, August 19, we arrived at Maputo airport in the early afternoon. Sister Jeanne Amu, ASC, came to pick us up with the Sisters of the Precious Blood (CPS) who had gone to the airport to accompany their superior who was leaving for their Assembly.

After saying our goodbyes we set out for Mafuiane where we were welcomed by two priests who were at the seminary with the youth, the director of the Mime Center, the Precious Blood associates and the youth who were at the initiation seminary. With great hospitality they made us feel at home. After the welcome, we shared Mass with the Associates.

The next day, the General Superior and the Councilor, in their canonical visitation met with the members of the community: Sr. Giovanna Amu and Sr. Flaviana Alfred, who were also joined for the occasion by Sr. Lucina Johaness and myself.

On August 20 we set out for Eswatini, a small Kingdom in southern Mozambique previously known as Swaziland. We arrived at 9:00 AM and were welcomed by Bishop Jose Luis Gerardo Ponce de León, I.M.C. of the Catholic Diocese of Manzini. After breakfast we attended Mass presided over by the Bishop himself, in honor of the Virgin Mary of the Assumption, at Good Shepherd Parish in Siteki. The very joyful Mass with singing and dancing showed the way of expressing the faith life of the Eswati people. After Mass we were asked to introduce ourselves to the faithful, who as a sign of hospitality, gave us wine, and we took a photo together for the occasion. Then, accompanied by the Bishop, we began the tour of the Diocese of Manzini, which includes 17 parishes. After lunch we visited the apostolic activities of the diocese: hospitals, secondary and

elementary school, technical institutes, etc., taking the opportunity to continue our conversation with the bishop. In the evening we started the return journey to Mafuiane (Mozambique).

The next day, August 22, was a memorable day for the mission. During the Eucharistic celebration Sr. Nadia welcomed two womes, Beatrice Jose and Filomena Francisco, into the group of Associates of the Blood of Christ.

We really enjoyed our trip because of the Bishop's welcome that showed openness to our presence. The next day we started our return trip to Tanzania. On August 25, 2022, Sisters Nadia and Bridget left for Italy.

We thank God for guiding us well on our journey.

The Mission in the Aeta Indigenous Community

The **Aeta** are an ethnic group of the island of Luzon, in the Philippines. They live by hunting and gathering, and should be considered as the first inhabitants of the Philippines, as they were already present on the island at the time of the migrations of Austronesian peoples.

So far, I've been to Pampanga twice to join a mission to help the Aetas. In comparison to us who live in cities and revolve our lives around technology, living in an Aeta community may be difficult for us because they rely on nature to meet their needs. Planting vegetables and waiting months to sell them at a low price in the market is their usual way of making money, which obviously does not allow them to afford other necessities, particularly medical and dental care.

As an ASC Youth assigned to the registration area, I was saddened to see a list with over a hundred names of people who require medical or dental attention. Nonetheless, it made me happy and relieved that through this mission, they would be able to receive proper consultation and medication from ASC missionaries as well as from volunteer doctors and dentists. They also received donations from our dearest donors, such as slippers, clothes, toys, and school supplies and biscuits.

The genuine smiles and gratitude on their faces were priceless for a mission that only lasted

a day. More than that, what amazes me about them is how they found happiness through simple things.

Archivists' Focus Group

Highlights Common Concerns

On Tuesday, August 16, Brianna Southworth and I, the two archivists for the U.S. region, participated in a small CARA (Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate) focus group to share ideas about the state of archives for religious communities. In the fall, both Bri and I had filled out a CARA survey for archivists, so we were invited to be part of the focus group.

Facilitated by Patricia Wittberg, SC, the group had a lively conversation about the future of our congregational archival collections. We were encouraged to share our challenges in creating and/or maintaining an archive, plans and budgets, and the resources we need to maintain what we have. Most of the participants addressed a common concern about the future of our archives. A few of the participants are in the process of creating an archive from a jumble of documents; two are in the completion stage and are planning for sites to house their collections. Many congregations are hiring lay, professionally trained archivists, sometimes pairing them with a seasoned community member who knows the background and history.

When Pat asked about what we needed, responses ranged from more support and understanding from leadership to increased collaboration. "Increased collaboration" seems to be key right now, as some congregations are working on collaborative sites for several communities' collections.

A unique feature of our U.S. region archives is the location of two sites; Ruma houses the oldest U.S. documents and artifacts while Wichita contains the Columbia archive as well as the Wichita. At the end of July, Ellen Pierce, an archival consultant, spent several days in Wichita with Bri and me to suggest directions for our future. Ellen suggested new organizational methods, future policies, and guidelines, all of which will be helpful in better preserving our documents and artifacts.

Our archives are one of the repositories for our charisms, legacy, and future directions, once we learn how to access and interpret them. Aware that we are in a long line of careful and talented archivists, Bri and I are doing our best to cherish and preserve what has been handed down as our legacy.

A New Year at Newman

A new academic year at Newman University has begun and there's an abundance of life and excitement on campus! Classes began on Monday, August 22. However, many activities occurred prior to that date that told everyone on campus the beginning of school was near.

Fall Sports Athlete Arrival - volleyball, men and women's soccer, and cross country (men and women as a unit) - arrived on August 6 and began practice on August 8. Because the dining center did not open until August 15, many folks contributed to meals for the resident students, including the ASCs. Members of all four teams joined the Sisters for lunch on August 11, 12, or 13. Great conversations helped the students understand and feel the connection with the ASCs.

Enrollment numbers are not official until the 20th day of class but it seems apparent that Newman has great news this fall - 196 new fulltime freshmen students (159 last year); 165 new transfer students (133 last year); 108 degree-seeking graduate students and another 131 non-degree seeking students enrolled in certificate programs. The residence hall count is 221, up from 174 last year. Yes, there's life and energy everywhere.

New initiatives for student success include

a peer support program for new international students (25 as of this date) by being paired with a returning international student who is their "go to" person. A noon luncheon on August 23 began the connections, but many returning students had already reached out to the new students. Countries include Latvia, Lithuania, Belarus, Uzbekistan, France, United Kingdom, Italy, Greece, Spain, Kenya, Zimbabwe, Kenya, Tanzania, Egypt, Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Mexico, The Bahamas, and more.

Quiet/Reflection Rooms have been created in Carrocci Hall and McNeill 115 to give students additional options to chapel for reflection, prayer, and quiet time. The items in each include both the Bible and Koran as our Muslim students have been lacking in a place to pray other than their rooms.

Laudato Si/Circle K combined forces to post cardboard recycling signs by the dumpsters during move-in days to recycle boxes and boxes and boxes and prevent overloading the dumpsters. Circle K is focusing on campus recycling this year has successfully obtained a \$400 seed grant that will be matched or even increased in spring semester based on their activity this fall.

During the celebratory lunch, the guests were briefly acquainted with Sister Krystyna's life and work, presented through a slideshow of photographs of the various events in her life: from her childhood, to her entry into the ASC Congregation, through a presentation of her

The most important role a sister must play, regardless of her duties, is to follow Jesus and to want God's dream to be fulfilled in her life.

13th Summer Camp - Olib 2022



The 13th summer camp for young people was held on the island of Olib, in the "Sanguis Christi" Center of the Adorers of the Blood of Christ. The first camp with the sisters was held in 2008 and has been going on since then. The only year the camp was not held was 2020 due to the coronavirus pandemic. The values of community, friendship, exchange of life experiences, enjoyment of the benefits of the Olib beaches and the beautiful sea, prayer, meditation, Eucharist, and games are the characteristics everything this camp offers, and those who repeatedly return to

the camp as a choice for their rest, both spiritual and physical. This year, 2022, the camp was organized in three terms. The first two sessions gathered students and working youth, while the third session was organized for high school students. During that time, the young people, together with the leaders, considered Moses' life path and his mission.

Moses is among the few characters in the Holy Scriptures that we follow literally from birth to death. He is the great leader of the community who makes the Covenant with God at Sinai after the liberation from the house of slavery. Just as he is drawn from trouble, so Moses himself will be ", the one who pulls out", the deliverer out of trouble.

When a biblical text allows God to pronounce

the name of the person he is addressing twice, it signifies an intense intervention of God in life. Thus Moses at the burning bush twice hears his name (Exodus 3,4) when he gets the task of freeing an entire nation from slavery. God allows his chosen one to sincerely express to him his resistance and the fears he has in the vocation.

Moses prays for the people who worship the golden calf (Exodus 32,10–14).

And finally we know how Moses obeyed God until death. Jesus Christ, the new Moses, the Son of God, gave a new covenant, confirmed all that the Father of heaven had done before. By his shedding of blood, the Redemptive Blood, the price of salvation, he gave us an example of how to live: to Love God and neighbor.

Indeed, young people with very interesting lectures, workshops, dialogues, get to know themselves and others. The beauty of communion, action, mutual work and conversation, rest, socializing is what is provided at the camp, and above all a view directed at Christ, as first love.
