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Aging: a Time of Fullness to be Discovered

During the Angelus on July 26, the feast of Sts. Joachim and Anne, Pope Francis gave a special invitation to the young people to show tender love to the elderly by *reaching out to them*. Today, according to the UN data, 10% of the population of our society is elderly and in 2050 it will be 25%. Ours is a civilization that has brought well-being and progress to some parts of the globe, but it has not yet filled the years with meaning which prosperity has added to life.

The pandemic with its isolation has brought to light the silent and often forgotten, ignored or abandoned world of the elderly. In fact, progress, if on the one hand has brought benefits to people by lengthening the life expectancy, on the other it has generated a sense of indifference toward our neighbor, emptying life of its truest meaning: relationships. This experience has revealed to us that our modern civilization does not have a culture of aging. And yet, the elderly have the most important role within history and society: they are the memory for humanity.

As is stressed in the Bible, old age for us Christians is a blessing, because it is the time when the person reaches her fullness and is replete. (1 Chron. 29:28) The being replete of old age is defined by valuing one's personal relationship with God. The elderly person is a **blessing** for the members of the family, the community and for humankind in general because he or she

represents faithfulness in his or her relationship with God and is a sign of God's faithfulness, of the efficacy and fulfilment of the Lord's commands. The God of the Bible believes in the future of the elderly (Job 3:1), for He hopes, just like for every believer, that the elderly person will continue to be a *disciple* who is always ready to discern, to encounter the Lord in faith, to discover Him in prayer. The elderly person is a *witness*, a treasure trove of lived faith, of an experience that becomes a wise, valuable and, for however fragile, solid and virtuous voice.

The call of our time is, therefore, that of again shining a light on and valuing the charism of old age, the gift of the Spirit, which is poured out on the elderly and which our faith helps us to understand and love. Let us remember that a tree lives only by drawing its nourishment from its roots.

St. John Paul II is among the figures who knew best how to express old age as a *fullness and being replete* with life, showing humanity that even suffering and the weakness of a fragile body can become the highest witness of faith. The transcience of the elderly is not a limitation but a grace, as an image of Christ's suffering on the cross. (2 Cor. 12:9)

Exiting the chapel of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, built a short time before by Father Miguel Macintosh, a Redemptorist, we passed along the muddy streets, getting stuck in the potholes and getting out to drier land...

Paulina appreciated my fervor for Sacred Scripture, especially during the "Carlos Mesters" biblical circles experienced with Brother Simone in Manacapuru, AM.

The topics developed were: Forgiveness, Baptism and Reconciliation, the Biblical Key

booklet, by searching for significant words, such as WATER. We helped each other with the Baptismal Ritual, to do the sacramental service that Paulina had already used in three other areas of Mission.

Paulina took advantage to give witness among those simple people. I felt Baptism like rain, like flowing water descending from the temple that took away many people's lack of faith and made hope be reborn in a new Pasch that would soon arrive.

Along the road returning home we continued to talk with many people about these topics.

This very deep experience was a strength for my ordination to the priesthood.

I want to say that Sr. Paulina was a missionary woman who taught me to be with the people, to see my future priesthood as service.

Trust in the Slow Work of God

The pace of our lives in recent months has been very different. In most cases, things have slowed down. We may have meetings, but all the travel is gone. We may have projects working with others that are "on hold" because of the virus. When our routines change like this, we begin to wonder what we should be doing.

Even for those of us who are busy these days, it often has more to do with disinfecting everything so we can be safe from this virus we cannot see and really do not understand.

As a college student in the late '60s, I was introduced by S. Delphine Schmidt to Teilhard de Chardin, SJ in a philosophy class. I liked the poetry of his writing, but it took me much longer to appreciate his message. In his book, "Hearts On Fire" he writes:

Above all, trust in the slow work of God We are quite naturally impatient in everything to reach the end without delay. We should like to skip the intermediate stages. We are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new. And yet it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability and that it may take a very long time. Only God could say what this new spirit gradually forming within you will be. Give our God the benefit of believing that his hand is leading you, and accept the anxiety of feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete.

If we attempt to integrate our recent celebrations of Easter, Ascension, and Pentecost with the words of Teilhard and our experience of staying at home, we would somehow have to integrate the power of these celebrations with the scriptural assurance of peace and Teilhard's reminder that God's time is different than ours.

God is very active in our hearts and souls during this unusual time in our lives. We are being given the chance to practice our patience, reorder our priorities, and experience new ways to pray and wonder and learn. It is ok to wonder about our feelings of confusion, boredom, loss. It is ok to wish that things would go back to normal even when we know they will not. It is ok to be frustrated with others as long as we acknowledge it is our need, not theirs that we are feeling.

Be gentle with yourself and believe in the slow work of God. Be gentle with the other who is experiencing the same instability that you are. Be gentle.

"With admiration I remember, she wrote to her German counterpart, Frank Walter Steinmeier, in March, 'Here in numerous areas with many victims, the oldest generation was decimated – those who were a reference point for the young, not just in their affections but also in their daily lives.' Heartfelt thanks! At night during the 'stay at home,' we saw trucks with coffins where the virus had sealed off the lives of so many grandfathers and grandmothers. Your moral stature, dear President, along with that of Pope Francis, have been a solid point of reference in this tried and fragile society."

But from one day to the next she found herself in a reality in which no one would come to visit her, she didn't see her children anymore, much less her grandchildren. This created within her a greater sense of being lost and worried.

Luckily, she had a fixed person who took care of her and, when possible, her children living in the same building went to see her while respecting the rules and keeping the necessary distances.

We made video calls several times, trying to communicate our affection and love. It was hard but fortunately, up to now, everything is better and, with the right precautions, we can finally be together with our grandmother to show

her again that she will never be alone.

conclusion, In think that grandparents are pure gold. This virus has shown us once again importance the holding hands, giving a kiss, a hug... It has shown us that the human person is fragile in the face of nature. So, I think the time has come to give back to our grandparents all the love they have given throughout the years, all the times they gave



to us, but especially, I believe that this virus has made us understand that we need to take care of them in their weakness, like they did for us when we were small and weak.

Our Commitment for Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation

Sr. Rani Padayattil shares the content of her thesis: All is One: Precious Blood Spirituality and of Creation, presented last May 19, at the Gregorian University

To understand the involvement of the Church in JPIC issues we need to go back to the Second Vatican Council (1965) that in the Pastoral Constitution *Gaudium et Spes* (90) expressed the desire to create a tool at the service of the Universal Church to promote progress in poor areas and social justice among peoples.

It was after the publication of the encyclical letter of Pope Saint Paul VI, On the Progress of Peoples (1967) that the pontifical council Justice and Peace was created. In his letter Octogesima Adveniens the Pope recognised that there is a thirst for justice and peace in every human being and this needs to be quenched (n. 48). Also outside the Church people of good will are at work to pave the way for more justice and we should collaborate with them.

It was in 1971 that the Bishops' Synod on "Justice in the World" took place. In its final document it declared: "the work of justice is an integral part of the mission of the Church to evangelize".

Since then many JPIC commissions were erected in dioceses and religious congregations. The development of the social doctrine of the Church by the later Popes gave a boost at this commitment. We ASC also made it a point to put it on the agenda of every General Assembly, Extended General Council, and in our Regional Assemblies.

The Spirituality of the Blood of Christ calls us and sends us forth to care for creation. Our troubled earth is a sign of the times, a call of the blood to which we must respond. It demands from us a new sensibility, a new way to deepen our relationship with God, with others, with ourselves and with creation.

The title of our Congregation "Adorers of the Divine Blood" reminds us that we have to be ready to give our life for whom it is needed. So that the Divine Blood will be adored and blessed by all and it bear fruit in the salvation of all. St. Maria De Mattias writes, "God wants the most precious Blood to be in the hearts of all" (Lt. 258). This lowly Congregation which lives and labors under the glorious title of the most precious Blood of Jesus Christ, must itself take on the shape and pattern of a living image

of that divine love with which it was shed and of which it was and is, a symbol, expression, measure and pledge. It is a symbol of Love, Life, liberation and communication of grace but also establishing a beautiful order of things which the great Son of God came to establish upon earth through His Divine Blood. (LC. 1# 2,3).

For Maria each human person was very precious because each is redeemed in the Blood of Jesus. She practiced *humility, patience, trust, obedience*, the spirit of adoration above all Charity. The spirituality of the Blood makes us more sensitive to these cries of the Blood and compels us to respond to the cries of the innocent blood so rampant in our world today.

Today our world counts more than 50.8 million internally displaced persons forced to leave their homes because of conflict, violence or persecution. The internally displaced persons live in very difficult situations as they struggle to find safety within their home country or are unable to reach and then cross an international border to claim refugees status. In this time of COVID-19, we have seen this already radically vulnerable group running increased protection risks from their own governments. This has stirred us to reflect on the displacement in our own hearts and on the flows in our economic and political systems. Greed can so easy displace compassion. Deep in our hearts we know that care for others-not exploitation of themmakes us truly human.

And you, what can you do?

For the last five years 5 years Pope Francis has asked us to celebrate *Laudato Sí*. A nice opportunity is to join the <u>Season of Creation</u> celebrated ecumenically around the world each year from September 1st to October 4th.

Christians unite in praying and acting together to care for our common home.
